I have seen so many wonderful girls develop and grow in my time and I am constantly amazed at their achievements both in school and after they leave. I am inordinately proud of them. Maltman's girls find their path, work hard and enjoy life. Most importantly, they are tolerant, caring, respectful and follow their interests and passions.

When I came to the school, the beautiful pool had just been built, and before that much of the old building had been restored and new classrooms blocks built. I felt that it was time for a pause on building works so focused on growing our IT capacity. We went from from a few computers to the amazing network, multiple devices and digital ready classrooms that we have today. This successful development owes much to the strategic thinking and skills of Mr Pardon who has been our Network Manager in my time.

While we may have put a pause on building works, we didn't stop them completely, and Maltman's Green has a way of evolving and growing to meet the demands of a modernising world and the needs of its pupils. Over the past 15 years we have extended and refurbished the dining room and kitchens, added a house fit for a modern Head and extended, retooled and refitted the Lapraik Hall into the wonderful performance space it is today. Let's not forget the incredible addition of our Little Malties Day Care setting, which was so popular in its first year that we had to double its capacity. There have also been a host of smaller projects such as flood lighting on the tennis courts and refurbishment of the discovery garden.

We were and still are a front runner in this area and our Eco Council work tirelessly to develop new eco initiatives – I know I'll be leaving the Maltman's ecosystem in good hands!






## Maltman's Green School Archives



## Gap Year Support Assistant

### 1 Year Position Required September 2020

Are you planning a Gap Year next year? Do you have a genuine interest in working with children and a flexible approach? Each year we recruit gap year support assistants for a one year placement, and have had many old girls apply and take up this position. The role will include supporting in class as well as assisting teachers with children in either the Pre-Prep or the Prep School. You will be assisting with the day to day running of our before and after school care. This is a full time position working weekdays, term time only.

Under the direction of the Headmistress the main responsibilities of this role include:

- Assist teachers in the classroom during lessons;
- Assist in setting up and preparing activities;
- Assist with computing in the classroom;
- Assist with display work;
- Assist on educational visits if necessary;
- Break-time supervision as requested;
- Lunchtime supervision in the dining room and during playtime;
- Breakfast Club or After-school club supervision as required;
- Assist with after-school activities as required;
- Assist in the School Office with administrative tasks as required;
- Follow the whole school Health and Safety Policy;
- Attend planning and staff meetings when necessary. These may be outside school hours;
- Accompany residential trips as required.

## Gap Year Support Assistant 1 Year Position Required September 2020

**Jessica Geneen was a pupil from 2009 to 2011 and has recently completed a Gap Year placement. Find out about her experience as a MGS Support Assistant.**

"I decided to apply for a gap-year position at MGS, after a tiring A-level year, to give myself a brand-new experience before continuing with education. I knew from previous work on summer camps that I enjoyed working with young people, and I had fond memories from the 2 years I attended MGS myself.

I assisted mostly in the Art and CDT departments. I enjoyed revisiting the skills I'd learned from MGS and occasionally I could make my own craft projects alongside the class! Playground duty and After-School Club were some of my favourite parts of the job, as I could get to know the girls and keep up with their interests and endeavours. There's always an interesting conversation to be had! Of course, being able to accompany trips like Bushcraft, Swanage and Hampton Court was a wonderful aspect of the job, as it brought back just how exciting residential trips always were.



I've often been asked, "Has Maltman's really changed in 10 years?" Some aspects are different – there seems to be a bigger array of clubs than I ever thought possible – and certain traditions are, of course, still around, like the time-honoured curtsey and grace before meals. The bottom line, I think, is that the experience of moving through primary school doesn't change. It was thought-provoking to observe from a different perspective the same kinds of dynamics, worries and victories that I remember so clearly from being a pupil at MGS. I'd like to think it's given me a little more empathy and wisdom.

The year was a valuable learning experience. Having the girls come to me with pastoral problems was a big responsibility to adjust to. I'm grateful to have had a supportive team of staff who helped me learn. I also had lots of practice thinking on my feet and experienced really being part of a workplace for the first time. Aside from the personal and CV boosts, the year was just plain fun! As gap-year jobs go, working in a school is definitely one of the best. It's varied from day-to-day while still providing a solid routine. Plus, there's always a friendly greeting for you, from a teacher or pupil, so you can never feel lonely. I'm now halfway through my first term at university, and although MGS seems like a long time ago, I often find myself missing it!"



## Maltman's Past, Present & Future

One of the beautiful things about Maltman's Green is how it has managed to retain the same indomitable spirit and a passion for all-girls education for over 100 years. Those who return to the school comment on how the old house hasn't changed and remark on the same 'feel' that pervades. But of course, some things have changed....

Most old girls comment on the upgrades to facilities. We now have an indoor, 6-lane swimming pool, state of the art performance hall, fully equipped science, art, CDT, music and IT rooms, as well as floodlit sports courts, a gymnasium, discovery garden, two overflowing libraries, digital whiteboards in every classroom and a fabulous dining room. You'd be forgiven for thinking there's nothing left to build, but you'd be wrong. Plans are currently in place for a modern, specialist Early Years centre to house our girls in Little Malties Day Care, Nursery and Reception. We are also looking into installing an all-weather, multi-use games area to complement our already exceptional sports provision.

And it's not just physical facilities that have seen an improvement, but also digital ones with the introduction of a pupil management system for parents, an intuitive email platform and plans for a much more data rich performance tracking software with a teacher, pupil and parent interface. With a parent body who are far more engaged with their child's learning than ever, these developments are imperative.

One thing that has not changed at Maltman's Green is that we are an all girls school with a passion for all girls education. This approach means that we can tailor our teaching specifically for girls, playing to the strengths of their learning style. We have adopted a creative curriculum – an immersive teaching method that works across subjects to bring a greater depth, breadth and understanding to a topic. Our creative curriculum is unique in both content and our teaching approach, which offers a real-life, practical application. Here, there are no limits to learning. We believe that girls need to face challenges and take risks every day, and while not pushing them too far outside of their comfort zone, we also ensure that we do not hold them back.

This develops a personalised learning style where each girl is encouraged to work towards individual goals based on detailed monitoring and feedback of their progress and assessment. We believe that this leads to a positive attitude to learning that develops confidence, motivation and aspiration. We advocate the power of positive reinforcement – an effective way to develop the growth mindset and resilience needed for life beyond Maltman's Green.

Maltman's has remained a non-selective school with enviable results which mirror those of selective schools – something we are very proud of and which we believe we owe to our innovative, relevant curriculum, our exceptional learning support, extensive extra-curricular opportunities and holistic approach to social and emotional wellbeing.

There is no typical Maltman's girl, but a richness of interest, skill and achievement. We strive to provide the experiences, opportunities and guidance needed to enable our girls to become the best they can be, as well as discover passions and develop a lifelong love of learning.

## All Girls Education

Maltman's Green has been an all girls school since it was founded in 1918 by Miss Beatrice Chambers – the same year that women first won the vote. Able to adapt, evolve and respond to shifts in the education sector, family life and society at large, Maltman's Green has continually provided a top-quality education for young girls, giving them the attitude, confidence and skills to break through whatever barrier may be before them.

At Maltman's Green our girls are not subject to gender stereotypes and consequently they fill every niche within the School community with no sense of limitation. With specialist teaching and excellent facilities, our girls are given every opportunity to achieve, whether in the science lab, concert hall, swimming pool or on the sports pitch. But most importantly, they are taught how to believe in themselves – empowering them for whatever future awaits.

We offer a supportive, nurturing, learning environment where girls are given every opportunity to flourish, to take responsibility and to develop leadership qualities. We ensure our girls have the belief and self-confidence to achieve, to explore their talents without limitation and to discover passions and interests that will last a lifetime.

We understand that girls learn differently to boys, responding better to a more collaborative approach, so we ensure that our teaching styles reflect this. Girls at Maltman's Green enjoy problem solving and benefit from techniques that include investigation and discovery. One such example is our hugely popular Maths Murder Mysteries – the girls have to solve maths problems to unlock clues and solve the mystery. By working with the girls' strengths we can achieve so much more.

## The Benefits of All-Girls Education

Although there are no statistics at Prep level, senior school data shows that girls in single-sex schools achieve higher academic results compared to those in co-educational environments. The Girls Schools Association shows that girls taught in single-sex environments are more likely to choose STEM subjects at higher education – subjects which have traditionally attracted a greater number of boys.

A 2018 report in the USA, shared by the Girls School Association, shows that all girls' school leavers at senior level:

- Have stronger academic skills;
- Are more academically engaged;
- Demonstrate higher science self-confidence;
- Express stronger community involvement;
- Display higher levels of cultural competency and social tolerance;
- Exhibit increased political engagement.

## Memories of Maltman's Green from Melinda Rushe (nee Williams) A pupil at the School in the 1980s

I have so many memories of my time at Maltman's. I remember the bell that rang for end of lessons was an old swiss cow bell, with a thick leather strap. Whoever was chosen that day to ring it would walk around the school ringing the bell.

When I first arrived at Maltmans age 9/10, every night we had a bath in 'Bionic' bathroom. The water in each bath was about 5cm high - and cold! All the baths filled up at the same time. We were allowed about 5 minutes, then we'd get out, they'd drain the baths and a new lot would come in. The best bit was that we were allowed to choose who we had a bath with! As we got older up the years we still had nightly baths but not in Bionic, there were a number of bathrooms, but we still had to share. It was quite fun deciding who your bath buddy would be.

When it was our birthday we were allowed to run up and down the main hall stairs. It was a challenge to see who could do the most runs - I remember getting into the thousands and being very pleased with myself. We must have been fit!

At the end of term we would be allowed to have a midnight feast anywhere in the grounds. We chose a roof top outside of our dorm window. We'd been hoarding sweets in our tuck boxes for weeks. I remember us all in our nighties sitting high up on the roof, eating our feast!

For church on Sundays we would be given 5p which we had to keep in our glove. We'd then have to walk, what seemed miles, to church. I was quite small so often I got to go in the car which was a relief!

I remember once getting into serious trouble - we were playing horses in the orchard (International Velvet was my favourite film at the time.) We had made jumps between the trees with old branches and were having a great time, but we didn't hear the bell for supper. I remember someone running across the field and telling us that we were late and we were going to be in big trouble with 'Granny' our housemistress because no one knew where we were.

I remember many times being sent to sit on the 'hot seat' for something naughty I had done. Our house mistress who we nicknamed 'Granny' was very strict, and we didn't like her very much! The first time I was sent there I remember being surprised that the seat wasn't hot! There was a thick pipe that ran underneath the wooden seat which carried hot water, which was why it was called 'hot seat'.

On Sunday nights we'd watch a film in Mrs Asprey's sitting room - we were allowed to eat sweets while we watched the film. My parents lived overseas and my aunty Peggy used to buy me yellow toffee bonbons which I'd eat as we watched - they were delicious!

I remember playing outside and there was a full eclipse of the sun. We didn't know it was coming, and I still remember the silence - both of the birds and all of us playing.

We loved going to 'Top Patch' which was the school woods. We spent many happy hours, unsupervised, mucking about, making dens and climbing trees. There was this brilliant tree in the wood which had a long bendy branch coming out horizontally from it. At the end of the branch it had two natural hand holds. We would climb the tree, shinny along the branch and then hold on to the 'handles' and bounce ourselves up and down on the branch. It was so fun, we loved it! I remember spending loads of time there.

Opposite Top Patch there was a big sports pitch. One year the snow was deep, and we had the most massive snowball fight on the field. The whole school was involved, even the teachers - we loved it! I lived in Hong Kong at that time, and it was the first time I'd seen that much snow.

These photographs were from Christmas 1981 and I remember my parents came over from Hong Kong. I had my hair tied up in platted bunches like Heidi!
