

We are delighted to announce a record 84% qualification rate in the Buckinghamshire Secondary Transfer Test (11+) by our current Year 6 girls. These girls are now eligible for a grammar school place in September of this year.

Our girls have received multiple offers and scholarships to excellent independent senior schools, including *Academic Scholarships to Cheltenham Ladies College, Godstowe and the Royal Masonic School, an All-Rounder Scholarship to King's Worcester, two Sport Scholarships to the Royal*

Masonic School, and four scholarships to St Mary's, Gerrards Cross (Academic, Art and two Sport). Final school allocations and independent school scholarships are still to be announced, and we look forward to announcing our Senior School destinations in the summer term.

To meet another whale.




The Whale


Huge well done to **Tess in Year 6** for her amazing line drawings. These are stunning! What a talented student.

Ariana in Year 3 got ahead of the game over half term. She knew that the topic of shape-poetry was coming up and so wrote a beautiful poem in her spare time.



World Book Day

Year 6 Mindfulness Workshop

Towards the end of January the girls in **Year 6** had the fantastic opportunity to enjoy a one hour Mindfulness Workshop hosted by parent, Ashleigh Wykes, a GB Wushu team member.

In the one hour workshop the girls learned about the origins and concept of mindfulness. They looked at key ideas in mindfulness such as focusing the mind, noticing distractions and observing through the five senses. They especially loved taking part in some mindful activities including paced breathing, body scans, and drawing.

Mindfulness is such a fantastic tool for managing stress or high pressure situations, such as, competitions and exams - the latter of which these girls have had to cope with as part of their senior school preparation and entry.

Mindfulness is also more important than ever now as we deal with the challenges of the current lock-down restrictions.

We hope the girls found the session helpful and have enjoyed putting what they learnt into practice!

Sports Leaders

Right at the end of term the girls in **Year 6** took on the challenge of completing the 'Play Maker' Sports Leaders Award. Throughout the day the girls learnt about the four most important elements to become an outstanding leader.

Working in groups they had to come up with a fun and engaging way to teach a PE lesson on a sport of their choice. The girls' confidence blossomed and it was great to see their knowledgeable and creative approach to showcasing their sport.

Academic Enrichment

Little Malties Round-up

The year in Little Malties started with a focus on construction as the girls got to explore lots of different building materials, such as wooden blocks, Duplo, Octons, foam blocks and large wooden planks. It was especially fun when they got to create one object out of two, such as poking marshmallows onto cocktail sticks and using shaving foam like cement to stick sugar cubes together. They made some fantastic structures and demonstrated excellent collaboration skills.

When the snow arrived in January the girls were naturally very excited, and so wrapping up warm, they headed outside to investigate, spotting lots of animal footprints in the snow and making snow castles in the water tray.

In French this term the girls learnt about animals and fruits. They have explored stories and taken part in lots of counting and matching games with Camembear and his little friend, Tiny Bear. In the second half of term the girls enjoyed learning about mini-beasts. Venturing into the woods to search under logs and in the soil for different species was definitely

a highlight. The girls paid close attention to the bugs' similarities and differences, counting wings and legs and noticing colours and patterns. Linked to this, they explored a range of stories written by Eric Carle, the favourite being 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'. The classroom has been decorated with a giant caterpillar, that the girls worked together to make, and the story has been incorporated into their French learning as they practised the names for the fruits in the story. They also enjoyed trying to move like mini-beasts - crawling, hopping, slithering and buzzing. Continuing this topic the girls then learnt about life cycles and welcomed five little caterpillars into Little Malties. They are now eagerly awaiting their transformation! Finally, the term ended with an Ugly Bug Ball with lots of mini beast themed games and activities. The girls looked fantastic in their mini beast costumes!

Nursery Round-up

We have been fortunate to be in school as normal from the start of term which allowed the girls to continue to develop their friendships, routines and to access the classroom environment. *Julia Donaldson* was the focus for the first half of term and the girls enjoyed focusing on the themes raised by a different Julia Donaldson book each week.

There were huge smiles all round when the snow came earlier in the year and the girls got to wrap up warm and explore the snowy school grounds! Of course, they enjoyed making and throwing snow balls and creating snow angels. Some of the girls were overheard discussing

why the snow had disappeared so quickly in some places and it was wonderful to hear them work out for themselves that it was because the sun was shining in those areas. Everyday is a learning day!

The second focus this term has been *The FIVE Senses*. Throughout this topic the girls have used their senses in a variety of activities, including sound games, tasting different fruits with their eyes closed, exploring and feeling textures, comparing eye colours and creating some wonderful scented paintings.

The girls also enjoyed pancake races on Shrove Tuesday, took part in



Book Week, sharing their wonderful costumes, and helped raised money for Comic Relief with their wearing of red noses!





Reception Round-up

At the turn of the New Year, the girls' topic unit 'Super Scientists' saw some budding biologists begin to shine! The girls learnt about the human, frog, and caterpillar life-cycles, researched their own questions online and produced some beautiful arts and crafts related to their learning.

In Maths, the focus was on introducing methods to solve addition and subtraction number sentences, as well as learning the value of coins. Teachers, Miss Freeman and Mrs Webb, enjoyed seeing some fantastic pancake cafes set up at home on Shrove Tuesday in which the girls could practise their money skills. In Literacy, the girls have been making use of 'WOW' words to write their own acrostic poems about butterflies – their first experience of poetry writing. Their super fact sheets about the animal life-cycles also showed just how much information they had learnt.

The second half of the term saw the girls returning to school with a spring in their step and a smile on their faces! During the first week back there was a focus on the personal, social and emotional needs of the girls, ensuring that they felt happy and comfortable back in the school environment. They played lots of team games and shared circle time activities, allowing them to reconnect and build on their friendships.

During the second half of term their Maths work explored problem solving and patterns – a popular unit and a favourite of many! The girls' new topic was 'All Around the World', with a focus on the continents of Africa, Asia and Europe. The girls enjoyed their virtual journeys to visit these destinations, learning about the animals and landmarks associated with each continent. They created holiday brochures and collages about their favourite travel destinations and completed a Maltman's Green passport when they had finished learning about each location. To round off the topic, the girls chose to visit our home continent of Europe, with a specific focus on the United Kingdom. The girls learned about our national landmarks and a little about the Royal family. After enjoying the story of 'The Queen's Knickers' they even created their own undergarments for the Queen to wear!

Right at the end of term the girls got to take part in the first ever Maltman's Reception cross country race! Huge thanks to the PE department for organising such a fun event for the girls. Academic Enrichment

Year 1 Round-up

The term started with distance learning and the girls and teachers were quick to adapt to this change. To kick start the term the girls enjoyed the topic 'What a Hoot' - learning about nocturnal and diurnal animals. They were set the task to make a bird's nest in their garden as part of their outdoor learning programme. Their creations were simply amazing and their teachers were extra impressed with those who created their own presentation about a nocturnal animal.

For their second topic of the term, 'Sights of the City', they headed off for a virtual bus tour of London over Teams. It was great to be able to experience this together and beaming in from home didn't stop the girls from enjoying the sights and sounds of our capital city. The girls always enjoy getting creative and really got stuck into their task to create a 3D model of a London landmark of their choice. We had Big Ben Clock Towers, A St. Paul's Cathedral, The Tower Bridge, The Shard, The Houses of Parliament and 30 St Mary Axe (the gherkin). These were made with recycled materials

found around the home and the sheer scale and attention to detail was very impressive! They have also been reading the 'Katie in London' book and wrote their own postcards.

For their 'Turrets and Tiaras' topics they worked hard to create their own castle design, complete with their very own dragon of course! They really enjoyed creating their own fairy tales set in their castle and had fun making crowns when learning about the monarchy of the United Kingdom.

Back at school the girls have been able to take advantage of our spacious grounds and natural woodlands. They used their team work skills and got creative to build houses for fairies out of natural materials, learning the different ways in which these materials can be used.

In the run up to the Easter holidays the girls took part in a variety of Easter themed activities. They put their arts and crafts skills to the test and had fun playing a variety of Easter games.



Year 2 Round-up

The start of a new term meant the start of a new topic. For the first half of term the girls were 'Independent Investigators'. They enjoyed learning about different inventors and explorers such as Christopher Columbus, Neil Armstrong and Amelia Earhart. After being inspired by these historical figures it was then their turn to be investigators. Their first task was to create a boat that could float out of recycled material. The girls were very delighted when they were successful. Next they researched an investigator of their choice and made a PowerPoint presentation to share with their class over distance learning. The teachers were very impressed with the girls work. The topic after half term was

'National Treasures'. The girls learnt about the United Kingdom and the different countries it is made up of. They learnt about Katie Morag and the Isle of Struay as part of their Geography work as well as explored maps, discussing the human and physical features of different areas. They also designed their own Tartan when learning about Scotland! Linking the topic to Book Week, the girls explored the life and works of Beatrix Potter and got to try their hand at drawing some of the famous characters. Of course the highlight of Book Week is dressing up on World Book Day and the girls enjoyed sharing their costumes with their friends over Teams.



To mark the end of term the girls enjoyed a big British picnic to celebrate their hard work. They bought in picnic blankets to enjoy their al-fresco food in the Head's Garden. They were also treated to a special Easter egg hunt in the woods!





Pre-Prep French

This term the **Little Malties** and **Nursery** girls have had fun with their topic of 'zoo animals' in French. They joined in enthusiastically with action games trying to be as 'grande' as la girafe, as 'féroce' as le lion and as 'effrayant' as le serpent. They looked at the French versions of two familiar stories, 'Dear Zoo' and Julia Donaldson's 'Monkey Puzzle'. The girls learnt and practised the names of many zoo and jungle animals that appear

in the stories. They all agreed that 'le chien' at the end of the Cher Zoo story was the perfect gift and we were all so pleased that 'le singe' found his mummy at the end of 'Où est Maman'?

Reception and **Key Stage 1** girls continued to work hard with their French during distance learning and Madame Barretto and Camembear really enjoyed being able to say 'bonjour' to the girls in some of the live



thoughtful questions. Getting creative, they made some beautiful works of art to consolidate their learning.





First Swim

The girls have been learning about Shanghai in their topic this term and were shown photos of the river. The girls chose to put a crocodile in the river and decided that a tiger needed to cross safely!

They worked collaboratively to construct different designs, which they then tested before reflecting on how they could be improved.

Their teacher, Mrs Webb, was very proud of their problem-solving abilities!



Exciting Egyptians

This term the **Year 4** girls have been learning all about the Ancient Egyptians. During distance learning they were tasked with creating a poster or PowerPoint presentation to showcase what they had learnt.

Many of the girls chose to do very informative presentations, with voice-over and lots of images. Some girls took this one step further and made something else of their choice - we had homemade canopic jars, a mummy and

the fabulous drawing below that really made us smile!

As part of their Spring Concert video the girls were given a song all about the Egyptians to learn and perform and it was great to see some of the girls dressing up for their recording.

The girls have worked extremely hard on this project and their teachers have been very impressed by what they have produced.



Spreadsheets and Formulas




A Year 6 Guide to Healthy Living

In the first half of term our **Year 6** girls explored the topic 'Keeping Healthy', to include a study of healthy eating and nutrition, exercise, the structure and function of the heart, the effect

of exercise on the body, the structure and function of the lungs, and the effect of tobacco on the lungs. This topic culminated with a task to write a magazine article on the importance of

the heart, and general tips on how to keep healthy. Take a look at these two wonderful examples from Simran and Phoebe.



Healthy Living


The heart is one of the most important organs in your body. It pumps blood around, all the way from the top of your head and all the way down to your little toe. The heart is also a muscle just like any other, so you need to exercise it to keep you healthy. But how do you exercise your heart? You run, jump, swim, do sports, cycle, play football...the list is endless! How does your heart work? Well, the left atrium collects blood in from a connecting blood vessel, nice oxygenated blood, and pumps it to the left ventricle, here it goes all the way round your body. The right atrium collects old blood from your body and pumps it to the right ventricle where it gets pumped to the lungs to get oxygenated, from here it goes to the left atrium to start again!



Other ways to stay healthy include eating good foods like lettuce. You need to eat all the food groups in the right amounts. About one third should be carbohydrates like cereal and bread, another third should be vegetables and fruit like grapes and apples. A small portion of what you eat should be protein like meat and eggs. Another small portion should be dairy like cheese and milk, finally, the last tiny slither should be fats and chocolate. Your body needs fat to keep warm and as an extra energy source, but not too much of it.

Smoking is very bad for you. Your lungs create mucus to catch any dirt going in when you breathe in, but if you smoke, then your lungs create too much mucus and you can get coughs and lung cancer.

Mental wellbeing is just as important as physical wellbeing. You should keep your mind clear and happy, try to do some meditation, mindfulness, calm colouring or yoga. Maybe you could treat your brain to doing something it likes over the half term? Have a fun day with no stress or a screen-free day?



Keeping the Heart Healthy!

The heart is responsible for pumping blood around the body, the blood carries oxygen and other important nutrient to the rest of the body and the heart is made of cardiac muscle. There are two parts to the heart the right side and the left side. The right side of the heart pumps oxygen poor blood picked up from the veins to the lungs and the left side picks up oxygen rich blood from your lungs and pumps through the arteries to the rest of your body. The Coronary Artery is responsible for bringing oxygen and glucose/ nutrients to the heart - if it is blocked you may get a heart attack.

The heart is a vital organ that helps keep the body alive. If we do not keep it healthy you could suffer from Coronary Artery Disease (CAD), Heart Arrhythmias, Heart Failure, Heart Valve Disease, Pericardial Disease, Cardiomyopathy (Heart Muscle Disease) and Congenital Heart Disease.

Here are some tips to keep your heart healthy. Eat healthy, get active, stay at a healthy weight, quit smoking and stay away from second-hand smoke, control your cholesterol and blood pressure, drink alcohol only in moderation and manage stress.



Year 3 Go Back in Time

The topics in History for the **Year 3** girls this term have been Iron Age Celts and the Ancient Romans. Creative tasks are always a great way to reinforce learning and the girls enjoyed creating their own Celtic torc. They were permitted to use whatever material they wished and we were delighted to see ones made of clay and even dough - which made a very good snack once the photo was taken! Moving on, they explored the Celtic roundhouse, learning their different features and thinking about what it would have been like to live in one. Again, their creativity came to the fore and they created some beautiful model roundhouses, including

one meticulously made out of wattle and daub (right).

Finally, the girls learned about Celtic warriors, and some of them even enjoyed dressing up as one!



Chinese New Year

Chinese New Year fell during our girls' distance learning period but they still enjoyed getting into the spirit, like sisters above with their creative artwork. Our Little Malties and Nursery girls were in school though, and they took part in a variety of themed activities, including making paper lanterns, dragon puppets and colourful fans, as well as exploring a range of media and materials such as red and gold noodles and play-dough, and coloured sand. They were also introduced to the story of the Great Animal Race and used puppets to visualise parts of the traditional tale. The theme continued into their music lessons as they explored Chinese instruments, danced to traditional Chinese music and learnt a new dragon song.




Computer Programming

Girls in **Year 5** have been learning how to make patterns using 2D shapes in the computer programme called Scratch.

The patterns are made by giving a character, or 'sprite', on the screen instructions on how to draw the shapes. The girls then think up creative ways to repeat the shapes using rotation. Once they have supplied the computer programme with the series of step-by-step instructions they press play and watch as a mesmerising pattern is created.

The photo on the right shows the pattern created by Alicja and you can

Art Round-up

This term girls in **Years 3 to 6** have been working on a broad range of diverse learning experiences. Inspiration for art projects have come from contemporary art, classical art, cross curricular and cultural themes.



To begin with, they looked at still life, taking inspiration from a number of famous artists and making their own composition using objects around them. Linked to this was the task to use mixed media to draw a favourite toy. These realistic styles really help the girls to focus on what they see in front of them. In contrast to this, it was great to see the girls imaginations come to life when tasked with listening to music and drawing what they feel. Without any visual clues this really helps to get the creative juices flowing!

A blend of the two styles above saw the girls incorporating typography into a landscape piece. A really great way to merge reality with imagination and develop clarity of thought, problem

solving and creative thinking!

During Book Week the girls enjoyed designing book covers, providing them with an opportunity to think about illustration techniques, layout and space combined with typography. The results are really quite captivating. Illustrator and author Beatrix Potter took inspiration for her book illustrations from the fashion collection at the Victoria and Albert Museum and this linked perfectly with the girls next task to dress their favourite animal with an item of clothing.

On the theme of animals, birds are always inspirational to artists, and making 3D shaped birds was an opportunity for the girls to think outside the box and construct their own intriguing works of art. Working off the paper and thinking in three dimensions is a great way to develop artistic talents.





CDT Round-up

This term, CDT has given the girls plenty of opportunities to flex their creative muscles. It all started with challenges to design cuddly toys, a school uniform, school equipment buggies, fabrics (below far right), special occasion wear and graphic design lettering. Throughout, the girls learnt about cotton - its history, properties, cultivation and uses. It was then time for some STEM challenges. The first was to make a boat out of a 30cm square of foil and see how much weight it would hold before it sank. There were some amazing results. **Sarah in 5P** managed to place 800g of pebbles in her foil boat! The second challenge was

to take 20 straws and build the highest tower that could stand on its own. We had some wonderfully high creations and some very architecturally striking designs. For their final challenges of the term girls in **Year 3** designed clothes for a card dolly and a venue for a fashion show, **Year 4** designed concept chairs, **Year 5** had to come up with their ideal fairground ride, and **Year 6** have had to devise a game that will entertain someone who is ill in bed, plus they have worked on their textile skills by making wall hangings. It's been a term full of challenges and the girls have risen to them beautifully.



Performing Arts



Prep Music Roundup

Music lessons during lock-down had to take a slightly different format to normal, however we hope the girls enjoyed learning their songs for the spring concert video, as well as learning about lots of different instruments with the 'Instrument of the Week' videos.

When the girls returned to school, the music department was a hive of activity once more. **Year 5 and 6** have been working with xylophones, developing their improvisation skills

whilst learning about bossa nova and swing jazz. Girls in **Year 6**, pictured above, work with scales used by Satie in his Gymnopédie No. 3 to create their own pieces with a focus on creating chords.

Meanwhile girls in **Years 3 and 4** have been working with glockenspiels, becoming familiar with these tuned percussion instruments and continuing to learn to read musical notation.

Our two **Handbell** ensembles were

busy rehearsing this term, flexing their musical muscles, and we look forward to re-launching our much missed Lower and Upper Prep Choirs next term.

We hope that parents enjoyed the alternative Spring Concert videos that were sent home. The girls worked really hard to perform their instrument solos and learn their songs and it wasn't easy to perform and record these from home. So a big well done to all those who took part.



Thank you to everyone who contributed to this collection for this very worthy cause.




Snow Day!


their favourite authors to their friends.


Books for Pre-Prep Girls

A Children's Classic


