Amazing Secondary Transfer Test Results

We are delighted to announce an 81% qualification rate in the Buckinghamshire Secondary Transfer Test (11+) for our current Year 6 girls. These girls are now eligible for a grammar school place in September of this year.

Each year our girls are able to choose from some of the best senior schools in the country, both grammar and independent, including Beaconsfield High School, Dr Challoner's High School, Wycombe Abbey, Haberdashers' Girls', St Helen's, Berkhamsted and Queen Anne's Caversham.

Twenty scholarships to independent schools have been awarded, including two All Rounder scholarships to The Royal Masonic School, a Sports Scholarship to Haberdashers' Girls' School, two Academic Scholarships to St Helen's School, a drama, a sports and a music scholarship to Berkhamsted

School and two Sports scholarships to St Mary's School.

We are incredibly proud of the girls and their superb achievements. They have shown hard-work, diligence and resilience throughout the testing process, along with a mature approach that has been noted by senior school heads. We know these girls have bright futures ahead!

The girls had a fantastic time as a year group. They all work so well with each other and really enjoyed each other's' company. It was a joy to see their great friendships and their teamwork skills.

Year 6 First Aid

The **Year 6** girls all enjoyed a 2-hour first aid course this term, teaching them valuable life-saving skills that really got them thinking. The workshop leader from First Aid for Life was very engaging and captivated the girls' attentions. She gave excellent demonstrations on CPR and instructed the girls what to do in an emergency situation. The girls got to have a go at CPR on the mannequins which gave a great experience of what it's like to give chest compressions, including just how hard it is to push down on the sternum by the required amount. The girls asked some really



thoughtful questions that showed just how inspired they were with this workshop. We're sure that, if needed, these girls would be able to put what they learnt into practice!

Walking in the Footsteps of Henry VIII

To support their topic in History of the Tudors, **Year 5** visited Hampton Court Palace. It was an exciting opportunity to see where Henry VIII had lived and to bring to life some of the stories they had been learning about in class. They explored the kitchens and were very excited to see the enormous fireplaces and imagine the intense heat servants who worked there were exposed to when cooking over one thousand meals a day. Visiting the Great Hall and the Watching Chamber exposed them to the grandeur and lavish lifestyle of the Tudor Courtiers and they were impressed with the ceilings and wall hangings. As Gracie (5E) wrote, "My favourite place was the Great Hall where the courtiers had their meals but in the night the servants slept there. We

learnt that The Great Hall was made for Anne Boleyn, Henry VIII's second wife". Mia (5P) wrote, "On the ceiling were beautiful sights of gold and blue patterns . It was amazing." Further explorations were made of the chapel where Henry VIII married his last wife. Kathryn Parr. the many paintings that hang in the corridors between these impressive rooms and some scary stories form the Hampton Court staff about ghosts roaming the hallways at night! A picnic in the grand gardens overlooking the fountain was a delight and provided a wonderful backdrop for lunch, followed by a tour of the gardens. The topic for the first half term was 'The World Around Us'. The girls began by learning all about recycling, understanding the refuse that can be reused and how it helps our world. They have also been learning about planet earth and made some lovely wind socks with the sea and land decorated on them. Following on from this, they started to focus on themselves, learning what makes us different and individual. They have also been on lots of woodland walks, collecting leaves, sticks and stones to make their own woodland crafts.

The girls have been enjoying some fun PE lessons which have incorporated moving around the gym and using the soft play apparatus, learning spatial awareness, and developing gross

motor skills. They've also unleashed their musical talents in their Music lessons with Mrs Penhale, learning lots of new songs, including Jack Frost and the sock song, which has been teaching colours and the days of the week. During French lessons with Madame Sylvia, the girls have been learning colours and working towards singing the rainbow song in French. Some of the girls have started swimming lessons this month and have enjoyed splashing around in the water and becoming more confident.

Nursery

The spring term has gone by in a flash! The girls really took to their Julia Donaldson topic and talked lots about sharing when reading the story Sharing a Shell; loved creating their own alien after reading The Smeds and The Smoos; made a pictogram of the most popular story written by Julia Donaldson; and made a stick man or lady when reading Stickman. The girls were lucky enough to receive a visit from a real doctor - Dr Owen, one of our dads. It was an interactive session where the girls asked really grown-up questions and had the opportunity to test out real doctors' equipment. There was also a visit by Mrs Mazinanian who talked to the girls about the importance of good teeth hygiene. The girls loved inspecting their own and each others' teeth! This term the girls have continued to learn and grow their phonic knowledge and skills through a variety of activities. These have included making junk model musical instruments and squeezing oranges for juice.

During Friendship Week Jigsaw Jenny helped to explain to the girls about always having kind hands, feet and words, and the girls shared what was special about their friends, such as 'playing together', 'they have a nice smile' and 'they are funny'. Cooking is a great opportunity to develop the girls' skills from counting and measuring, to physical dexterity through stirring and mixing. They loved making their very own 'snail bread roll' with Chef Adrian after reading Sharing a Shell. Chef Adrian was back with the girls later in the term to carry out a blind taste test. This was great fun, and everyone was so brave to try different foods and guess what they were. The second topic of the second half of term was 'senses'. When learning about the listening sense the girls were lucky enough to receive a visit from Year 6 girls who read stories to them during Book Week. They also went on a sound walk around the school grounds to listen to and identify everyday sounds.

Right at the end of term, the girls took part in the Pre-Prep Easter bonnet parade. Everyone had made their bonnet as part of their weekend challenge and took great pride in wearing them to share with their peers.













Reception

Spring term has been a productive one in Reception! The topic for the first half of the spring term was 'All Around the World'. Through this topic they learnt about the continents of Africa, Asia and Europe. When exploring Asia, the girls learnt about Chinese New Year and participated in many related activities, including listening and joining in with Chinese music, learning how to use chopsticks through sensory play as well as creating collage lanterns and tigers. They also found our about the landmarks of Asia including the Burj Khalifa, Mount Everest and the Gobi Dessert. In Explore and Learn the girls have been using a variety of construction equipment to build replicas of The Taj Mahal, The Petronas Towers, Gyeonbokgong Palace as well as other landmarks. The girls were also very interested in finding out about the native animals of Asia such as the panda bear, gibbon, komodo dragon, orangutan, and Bengal tiger.

On their travels around Europe the girls focused on the United Kingdom, identifying the different countries that belong to the UK and learnt about important landmarks and national animals.

Next, they were off to Africa! The girls were very interested in The Valley of the Kings and Table Mountain, and also learned about influential people who were born in Africa. The girls amazed us with their creative skills when they completed a weaving activity, creating colourful representations of African fabrics. They also looked at African towns, cities and villages and identified similarities and differences between them. They reflected on their own lives and thought about how it is similar or different to the lives of children in Africa.

In PSHE, the girls have been thinking about growth and change which linked well to Children's Mental Health Week. The girls had many opportunities to reflect, discuss and share their own journeys of growth and change, and considered the importance of having others in our lives and how this helps us to keep on growing, not just physically but emotionally too. In addition, they explored the benefits of exercise and healthy eating and looked at how these impact on our muscles, heart, and mind.

The second topic for the term was 'Life Cycles'. Through this topic the girls got to explore the life cycles of humans, frogs, and butterflies. The girls enjoyed taking part in a variety of tasks and activities relating to the topic. They engaged in sensory play as they created their very own frog ponds in class! They also used media to make observations on the life cycles

of a butterfly and frog. Girls recorded their observations using illustrations, diagrams, drawings as well as enacting key themes through drama, role play and artwork.

Book Day was celebrated this term. The girls enjoyed completing book related activities and were excited to come to school dressed as their favourite book characters. They were lucky enough to receive a fabulous workshop by author Peter Bently and illustrator John Bond all about their book 'Dogs in Disguise'. First of all they listened to the story and then had the opportunity to watch the illustrator at work. The girls enjoyed creating some illustrations alongside him.

The run up to Easter saw the girls enjoy some Easter themed craft activities and they loved creating and showcasing their amazing Easter bonnets! We can't wait to find out what the summer term has in store!











equal groups. They learnt fun songs to help them count in 2s, 5s and 10s, and practised measuring length, height and capacity. In the run up to Easter, the focus for the girls' RE lessons was 'Easter and surprises'. The girls enjoyed hearing Easter stories and learning about what Easter means to Christians. They also made some lovely Easter crafts and had great fun showcasing their homemade Easter bonnets in our annual parade!

Year 1

Girls in Year 1 began the term with their first topic 'What a Hoot', learning all about nocturnal and diurnal animals. They found it interesting to understand how animals adapt in winter and how they recognise the signs of winter. The highlight was making nests for birds in the Woodland School as part of outdoor learning, and they made some very informative booklets on owls to showcase what they had learnt. To link into this topic, the girls enjoyed reading 'Owl Babies' as their Literacy focus, and they wrote wonderful, adjective-laden character descriptions as well as their very own, imaginative versions of the story.

Girls got creative in their Art lessons based on Vincent Van Gogh's 'Starry Nights' artwork. After reading and learning about the artist and his art techniques, they then painted their own interpretation of his famous work. We loved the artistic flair and creativity on show - the girls really showed they had a good grasp of his style. Meanwhile in Maths, the girls used manipulatives to help add and subtract to 20+. They loved learning to problem solve and learnt number bonds to 20 in a fun and creative way. PSHE gave the girls a brilliant opportunity to think about their hopes and dreams and how they can set goals to achive these. It was great to see their perseverance shine through when talking about how to overcome difficulties in reaching goals. After the

half term the PSHE topic was 'healthy me' and the girls learnt how to identify healthy versus unhealthy foods, recognising ways to keep themselves fit and healthy.

The second topic of the term was 'Sights of the City', learning about the city of London through a virtual London bus tour. The girls loved creating 3D constructions of famous London landmarks while learning fascinating facts about the city. They tested their geographical skills by using a compass to navigate between landmarks on a map. Linking to this, their book in Literacy was 'Katie in London'. The girls loved writing postcards as if they were one of the characters. 1L presented a fabulous assembly on this topic with special guest appearances by the Spice Girls and the Queen!

After half term they moved on to a new topic - 'Turrets and Tiaras', learning all about the features of castles and the cities that have grown up around them. They really got stuck into the exercise to design their own personal coat of arms and excelled in writing job descriptions for people working in a castle. Their Maths skills were improved as they made 2D shaped castles, and in Art they made their own version of 'Castle and Sun' by renowned artist Paul Klee. The girls furthered their Maths knowledge learning about multiplication by adding





Year 2

The spring term has been an incredibly busy one for our Year 2 girls, full of engaging lessons and opportunities for independent learning. They continue to show us their maturity and already are beginning to demonstrate their readiness for the Prep School in September. The girls' first topic was 'Out of this World'. It started off with the book 'A Walk in London' by Salvatore Rubbino. The girls thoroughly enjoyed writing their own version of this book about their own local area. Next up it was 'Toys in Space' by Mini Grey. They explored the language and grammatical features used in the text before using this knowledge to write their own space adventure story. They are getting very good at using descriptive phrases.

In Maths, the girls began the term studying money! They recapped previous learning to ensure they were secure in their knowledge of the value of coins and notes, then used this knowledge to find ways to make amounts, find totals, subtract money, and find change. They also continued with multiplication and division, recognising and using arrays, using the multiplication and division symbols and using this knowledge to solve more challenging questions. The girls' excellent understanding of times tables provided a great foundation for this.

In Geography lessons the girls studied the seven continents and the five

oceans, whilst in Science there was a focus on everyday materials. They investigated a range of materials and observed their absorbency. Once they had an understanding of absorbency, they carried out an investigation to find out which paper towel would be best to soak up the most water. They then used this knowledge in their DT unit to design, make and evaluate their own moon buggies. In order to make successful buggies, the girls first learnt about the features of vehicles and how to create a simple, working chassis.

The second half of term saw the start of a new topic - 'MGS Globetrotters'. The English book focus was 'The Great Kapok Tree' by Lynne Cherry, where the girls gained an understanding of the importance of conservation of the Amazon Rainforest and a dilemma story. Whilst reading this text the girls learnt about persuasive language, speech and powerful verbs. They used these to write their own dilemma story using animals from the Amazon Rainforest. The Geography focus continued as the girls looked at Brazil, studying the features of the country and knowledge of their own lives to make comparisons. They used atlases and iPads to find out more information and locate Brazil on a map.

Their Science work in the second half of term looked at living things and their habitats. In Woodland School the girls learnt about living, dead or



never alive, and enjoyed searching for micro habitats. They then observed the animals that lives in the micro habitat and discussed why they might live there. The girls created wonderful dioramas of habitats to demonstrate their understanding.

The term's Maths learning came to a close with the girls studying 2D and 3D shapes and fractions. The girls demonstrated their previous knowledge of shape, recognising the properties of both 2D and 3D shapes. They then used this to describe and sort shapes using Venn and Carroll diagrams, and learnt about fractions of number and shape.

A huge congratulations to 2K on their creative and entertaining class assembly. We look forward to 2R's in the summer term. As we head into the Easter holidays we are exceptionally proud of the progress the girls are making in Year 2.

Prep English

Year 3 started the spring term by writing poems inspired by Vivaldi's 'Four Seasons'. They had fun reading and writing limericks before trying shape poems, identifying the features and discussing their likes and dislikes. This was followed by a cross-curricular link to their History topic, the Romans, where drama helped them understand the daily routines, thoughts and feelings of a Roman soldier. Written activities included a diary as a Roman soldier and a Roman-based adventure story. They concluded the term with a picture book study of 'The Tunnel' by Anthony Browne, focusing on character, setting and dialogue.

This term, Year 4 were immersed in the wild and wonderful world of animals, with lessons centred around their class novel, 'The Butterfly Lion'. Before starting the book, they shared their ideas about what a 'butterfly lion' could be. This was followed by vocabulary work, which was then used to write a pair of pyramid poems about these two very different creatures. There was much discussion as the story unfolded, giving the girls the opportunity to demonstrate their ability to empathise with the characters, and their descriptive postcard poems, in which they brought the setting to life, were most impressive. They also enjoyed writing their own stories, including their own 'Just So' tale, imitating


the structure and style of Rudyard Kipling. Throughout the term, they also practised their comprehension skills, using a variety of text types and completed beautiful 'Butterfly Book Reports' about a book that they had read independently.

At the beginning of the term, Year 5 embarked on an adventure in English, as they set sail with Michael, one of the main characters in their class novel, 'Kensuke's Kingdom'. Before introducing the novel, the girls played an adapted version of Kim's Game, in which they were challenged to memorise an assortment of seemingly unrelated objects and images and then predict how these might be connected, an exercise which later resulted in delighted cries of recognition as the objects appeared in the unfolding story and their relevance was revealed. The pupils debated whether the family's decision to sail around the world was a good one and presented their views in the form of a balanced argument. They read a range of story openings by Michael Morpurgo before writing their own opening paragraph, imitating his style, and selected a sentence from one of his books, to use as inspiration for a story. Short writing tasks included uplevelling Michael's message in a bottle and rewriting an extract from the book as a set of instructions. Throughout the term, they also worked hard on developing their comprehension skills,

looking at a range of text types and chose another Michael Morpurgo book to read independently.

Year 6 travelled back in time to the Elizabethan era where they explored the world of Shakespeare and studied one of his plays, 'Macbeth'. To introduce the topic, the three classes worked together and their first challenge was to identify the famous playwright from a set of clues. Working in small groups, the girls then pooled their knowledge of the bard, before carrying out independent research, which they used to write Shakespeare's autobiography. It was then time for the girls to put their own acting skills to the test and 'perform' Macbeth in Ten Actions, giving them the opportunity to get a sense of the structure of the play from beginning to end as they spoke the lines of ten memorable moments in the play. Following this, they enjoyed enacting more detailed scenes in a story woosh and empathised with Macbeth in a conscience corridor activity. Writing inspired by the play included vivid descriptions of the opening scene and the three weird sisters, as well as poems centred on the theme of ambition. The girls also impressed with their excellent speaking skills and highly original evacuee presentations, a cross-curricular link to History, and part of their class novel study, 'Carrie's War' by Nina Bawden.





Prep Maths

Our girls have had a busy term exploring new topics and becoming experts at foundational skills they will continue to build on in the future!

Year 3 have looked at fractions, both adding and subtracting fractions with the same denominator as well as comparing a range of fractions. They have also been learning different terminology relating to fractions such as unit and non-unit fractions. In addition to this they have been finding equivalent fractions and fractions of amount, both in number sentences and in word problems. The girls have applied their knowledge about regrouping in solving problems using the formal written methods for addition and subtraction. After this, Year 3 learnt how to use the formal method for division and multiplication. They then used this learning in solving a range of word problems involving division with and without remainders as well as multiplication. Checking calculations using the inverse has also been investigated as have the usefulness of fact families and times tables in general. Multiplying and dividing by 10 and 100 has been explored and calculations involving this skill have been solved.

Year 4 kicked off the term developing important fraction understanding. They applied this understanding to problem solve with fractions and

discover higher level fraction concepts, such as adding and subtracting mixed fractions, as well as using the lowest common multiple to make like denominators. The girls then transitioned to decimal operations and discovered connections between fractions and decimals. They made good use of the sunny weather at the end of term and converted between metric measures outside using chalk to explain their understanding.

Year 5 also started the term calculating with fractions and progressed to mixed problem solving with decimals and percent. As the term progress, the girls developed an understanding of shape and space. They worked on practical problemsolving involving area and perimeter of rectilinear figures, incorporating algebraic skills with formulae. The girls also enjoyed studying 3D shapes, particularly drawing nets that were folded to create their shapes. They also took part in some investigative work, plotting points on a co-ordinate plane to reveal the net of a 3D shape. They were then able to calculate the surface area of each shape.

In **Year 6** the girls reviewed their decimal operation skills by creating their own "Decimal Diner." Each student created an imaginative menu for a maths-themed restaurant complete with prices and special

discounts. They then created worded problems based on their menus for classmates to complete. The girls enjoyed stumping each other with some challenging questions! The girls then began working with shape, calculating the area and perimeter of rectangles, triangles, parallelograms and composite shapes. They wrapped up the term learning to draw 3D shapes on isometric paper. From their drawings, they were able to calculate the surface area and volume of each shape.

March was an exciting month for maths. March 14 was dedicated to the number, Pi! For Pi Day, Years 4, 5 and 6 read, 'The Dot' by Peter H. Reynolds. It narrates the school day of a girl who learned a lesson in perseverance by painting circles. Just like this character, the girls used their artistic skills to design a monochromatic circle. After their design was complete, they measured the diameter and radius of their circle and therefore calculated the area and circumference using Pi! Their circles are now displayed together making a collaborative art piece for the school to enjoy. March 23 was World Maths Day and **Year 6** took part in a global maths competition, testing their problem-solving skills.

A huge well done to all our Maltman's Green mathematicians!





It has been another busy and fully engaged term in Science!

Year 3 have been busy learning about Healthy Eating and The Skeleton. The girls discussed what is meant by a healthy diet and the seven main nutrients the body needs. Working collaboratively in groups, they came up with a poster campaign promoting the importance of healthy eating and presented these to the rest of the class. When it came to the skeleton, the girls were able to recall the names of specific bones and give the functions of the skeleton - protection, support and movement. One of the highlights of this topic was seeing the girls trying to make a Ghostbusters style Marshmallow man by balancing individual marshmallows on top of each other...they failed! This was because there was nothing supporting the marshmallows until Mr Kalyan introduced wooden cocktail sticks. By using these which represented the endoskeleton, the girls were able to keep the marshmallow man upright as it now had internal support.

Year 4 have been learning about teeth and digestion. The girls were able to recall the names of the different types of teeth in animals' mouths (incisors, canines, pre-molars, molars), and give their function. They also learnt how tooth decay occurs and how this can be prevented. They had fun

investigating which toothpaste brand was the best at removing stains. For the digestion part of the Year 4 topic, the girls learnt about the organs involved in digestion and the journey of food through these organs. This was backed up by showing the girls a model of digestion using a chocolate spread and banana sandwich, a potato masher (representing teeth), soap (representing saliva), a plastic bag (representing the stomach), vinegar (representing stomach acid) and tights (representing the small and large intestine). At the end of the sandwich's journey, they had made poo!

Meanwhile, girls in **Year 5** have been learning about forces. They looked at simple push and pull, magnetic forces, gravity, air resistance, friction, water resistance and up-thrust. They then applied these forces to real life examples such as forces acting on you whilst on a playground equipment (e.g. a swing and a slide). Girls experimented in the lab making paper helicopters with different size wings to see how this effected the time taken for them to fall to the ground; used friction boards to see which surface had the most amount of friction using Newton Meters; and used different shapes of play-dough to find out which was the most streamlined in water. The girls excelled in these hands-on investigations and showed impressive lab skills.









In **Year 6** the girls have been learning about the human body and how to keep it healthy. They discussed healthy eating and the functions of the 7 nutrients the body needs. They learnt what blood is made up of and the functions of plasma, red blood cells and white blood cells, along with the three types of blood vessels and the structure of the heart. They all really enjoyed using stethoscopes to investigate what changes happen to the body after exercise by measuring pulse rates.

A busy and fun term in the Science lab with more excitement to look forward to next term!







Spring Term was again another busy time for the girls in STEAM. They learnt new 21st century skills, brushed up on old ones and had lots of fun whilst they were doing it.

Year 3 had the challenge of protecting an egg from breaking when thrown out of a first floor window onto concrete. All teams had the same materials, but it was interesting to see how differently each team put them together. Once the packages had been thrown and then opened to reveal the results. the girls then created a wall display which illustrated what they had done and the teams then presented their work to the rest of the class. The next project was to experiment with different substances to fix a hole in a bucket. They used their scientific skills to measure and record the outcomes. Each team then presented their findings to the rest of the class.

Year 4 compared and contrasted water and wind turbines. In their teams they made a simple version of each one then worked out how to make them operational before considering how they could improve their design. Each team recorded what they had done via photographs or video which they used to make a PowerPoint. Their next

task was to experiment with different types of hand-made glue. They had to determine which glue was best for three different scenarios: strongest, most waterproof and easiest to clean off fabric. They presented their findings by way of a Glue Brochure as if they were the manufacturers.

The girls in **Year 5** have been using their creative production and critical thinking skills to manufacture a chain reaction machine to raise a flag. Once all the component parts had been made there was a LOT of working out how to make it operational; there was much frustration and then the absolute joy of achievement when the flag eventually raised! They then changed teams and captains to move onto the next project which was to write a short play that would be recorded and played back as if on the radio with accompanying sound effects, or 'foley', that they had made themselves. The results were extremely entertaining and the girls had great fun sharing their work!

Year 6 also made a chain reaction machine but theirs was a bit more complicated. The aim of their machine was to pop a balloon, so you can imagine what it was like in the



STEAM Lab when the contraptions were being tested! It was a lot of fun and all the girls discovered that accuracy and critical thinking, as well as collaboration and communication, are very important skills. Their second task was to design and make a toy or game that would help Year 1 girls with their English or Maths lessons using CAD CAM (Computer Aided Design or Manufacture). For this they had to analyse the problem, conduct appropriate research, create test products and then the final piece and finally test it out with the Year 1 girls while recording their results. They then had to feed back to the class via PowerPoint how successful their designs had been and whether they needed to make any improvements and why.

The tasks this term have really challenged the girls' problem solving and critical thinking skills, and they came together in teams to pool their knowledge and ideas. We're very impressed with their STEAM progress!







Prep Humanities

In History **Year 3** have been learning about the Romans, investigating what life was life for the Romans in Britain and developing an understanding of why they came to Britain and why they left. Their learning was brought to life through their Roman Day workshop (see page 6). Moving on from the Romans, the girls have enjoyed learning about the Anglo Saxons, looking at pictorial evidence found at Sutton Hoo and investigating who could have been on the burial ship. Meanwhile, in their Geography lessons the girls have been learning about India, focussing on the village, Chembakolli. They used mapping skills and explored a range of physical and human features of places within India. They have also learned about daily life, comparing it to our lives here. Looking into tea farmers the girls developed an understanding of Fair Trade. In RE the topic was Right and Wrong, and the girls had some great indepth discussions about the differences between right and wrong, in particular looking at real life scenarios and how we should best deal with them.

In Geography the **Year 4** girls have been looking at Waste and why it is so important to recycle. They started off the term by sorting out different types of rubbish, with many of them surprised at how long different items take to decompose. In groups, the girls had to bury items such as plastic, cardboard and a vegetable in a jar, they then got to open it six weeks later to see the results! We were lucky enough to even

get a visit from Jez from Greatmoor in Aylesbury, where they are working to turn waste into energy rather than send it to landfill. The girls had lots of thought-provoking questions and have shown real passion for saving our planet. In History the girls have been learning all about the Ancient Egyptians, leading on from their wonderful Egyptian Day earlier in the term. Lessons have been full of information on the River Nile, The Pyramids and Tutankhamun. The girls did an investigation on Tutankhamun's tomb and how he died using different sources of information such as newspapers, text books and the internet. They then stepped into the shoes of Howard Carter to write a diary entry for the day he discovered Tutankamun's tomb. They have also been learning about History Heroes such as William Wilberforce, Elizabeth Fry and Lord Shaftesbury. The girls chose their own History Hero to research and designed marvellous posters showcasing their chosen figure.

Meanwhile, girls in **Year 5** have been learning about the Tudor monarchs in their History lessons. They have enjoyed retelling the story of the Battle of Bosworth, examined paintings of Henry VIII for clues about his life, and researched his many wives. They have also enjoyed a day trip to Hampton Court Palace (see page 7). In Geography the girls have been learning about the Caribbean, exploring the physical and human geography of the many islands that make up this area of the

world. They have worked in pairs to discover facts about some of the natural landforms, produced news reports about the hurricanes that devastated some of the islands in 2017, and researched the country in more detail. And in RE, the focus has been on Islam and the girls have found out about the 5 pillars of faith as we as looking at the Qur'an and the design of a mosque.

In their History lessons, **Year 6** have been learning about Britain during World War II, examining the effects on people's lives. They have examined the lead up to the war and explored some of the changes that happened during the 1920s and 30s. They have also written diary entries and news reports about the Blitz and independently researched an event from the war. In their Geography lessons the girls have been studying tropical rainforests, finding out some facts about Brazil. They have researched a natural area of Brazil. used maps to find rainforests around the world, learnt about the unique flora and fauna of rainforests, and have worked in small groups to research and present information on a tribe of rainforest-dwelling indigenous people. In RE the girls have been learning about Buddhism. They have found out the origins of the faith, looked at the main beliefs and had many discussions about the 8-fold path and karma. They even took part in a cross-curricular activity to produced a piece of art depicting karma and rebirth using a medium of their choice



The focus in computing this term has been coding, using a program called Espresso Coding. Girls learnt how to code in HTML, Python and Block Coding.

In the lower end of the school, girls in **Reception** navigated around Simple City in Purple Mash to practise their mouse skills by clicking and dragging objects around the screen. They then learnt how to give instructions to objects on a screen using block coding. Girls in Year 1 learnt that programs respond to different sorts of inputs, and that the keyboard (not just the mouse) can be used to control objects on screen. In Year 2 the girls learnt how to make things happen in a sequence. They created simple animations and simulations and learnt how to de-bug code if their program didn't work.

In the Prep School **Year 3** were introduced to variables to count things and keep track of what is going on; they created simple games which used a score variable. They learnt how computers use repetitions and loops to make their program work and developed de-bugging skills to correct errors in their code. They also enjoyed using BBC Dance Mat to develop their touch-typing skills. In **Year 4** the girls learnt how to use HTML (Hypertext Markup Language) to make web pages and websites. They added pictures and formatted their page using styles and

fonts and changed the background colours. They also learnt how to create hyper-links to other web pages. Block Coding was used to learn how computers use numbers to represent things such as how fast things are moving and where they are, as well as how computers can generate random numbers and how they can be used in simulations.

Girls in **Year 5** learnt how to code in Python to perform tasks; they developed their de-bugging skills to correct errors in code and used hour of code to further develop their coding skills. They also discussed the internal components of a computer and how they all work together. The girls enjoyed researching different specifications to try and find the most powerful computer within a budget.

And finally, in **Year 6** the girls used Python to solve simple calculations and worked out the input command to ask questions with variables. They used Python to build a friendly chatbot. Did the chatbots fool their friends in thinking they were human? They further developed their coding skills using Hour of Code projects.

The **Prep** girls were given an additional challenge this term to enter 'The Rotary IT Graphic Design Challenge' to create a computergenerated document comprising words, pictures and graphic design







features to communicate the theme of 'Being Kind'. **Year 3** used Microsoft PowerPoint whereas **Years 4, 5 and 6** used Microsoft Publisher to create their posters as well as develop research skills. The poster topics ranged from being kind to oneself, being kind to others and being kind to the environment.



French

In their French lessons, girls in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 have built on their vocabulary, allowing them to be able to make longer and longer sentences. They are always keen to learn new French songs, which is a great way of teaching them additional vocabulary.

Meanwhile, girls in **Years 3 and** 4 have also been working on making longer sentences by using connectives such as "but/mais" and "and also/et aussi". They are also able to give their opinions and to justify using "because/parce que". This helps them to build and recognise more complex sentences.

Finally, girls in **Years 5 and 6** have started writing short paragraphs describing what they wear on different occasions (Y5) or describing their house and bedroom (Y6). The next step is always very exciting - role-play activities about clothes (Y5) and going to the restaurant (Y6).

Year 5 girls enjoyed a special treat this term, participating in an amazing full day drama workshop, led by the very talented Aesop's Theatre Company. To start the day, they enjoyed watching a brilliantly funny 75-minute, two-hander performance of 'Henry VIII', summarising all the key events of Henry VIII's reign and his six wives. The girls then enjoyed performing activities before working in small groups to produce their own, short plays.





After lunch, it was time to sit back and enjoy as we watched each super group perform. They really did shine with some hilarious stories based on Henry VIII. The acting skills were superb, their focus and participation were perfect and their behaviour impeccable for our visitors.



Learning to Bake

Our youngest girls have tried their hands at baking this term. Firstly, the Nursery girls enjoyed making coiled snail shaped bread rolls with Chef Adrian. The girls used their hands to mix the water into the flour creating a dough, which they then enjoyed stretching and kneading. Once this was nice and soft they rolled it into a sausage and then worked hard to create a spiral



shape to represent a shell. Girls in **Little Malties** got to try their hand at baking on Valentine's Day when they made heart shaped cookies, taking it in turns to mix the dough and then using their heart cutters to cut out their own shape that they then enjoyed decorating! When baked the girls got to take their goodies home.

The theme this term was 'Change'. The girls could write a poem or a story, create a junk model, collage or presentation, or even perform a science experiment!









Prep Drama

Year 3 started the term working on some group poetry of The Gingerbread Man and The Enormous Turnip. In small groups, they were encouraged to explore movement and action to add to their words and work collaboratively to create a performance. Following this, they enjoyed creating a Superhero! They invented fantastic character names, superpowers and then wrote and performed a 'Day in the Life of...' Miss Andrews was very impressed with their creativity, SUPER ideas and amazing confidence!

Year 4 have been working incredibly hard on their Year 4 production this term. For the first time, the three forms had their own mini production, but shared songs and a dance routine. They have been busy learning words, song lyrics, choreography and staging. Their

enthusiasm and dedication has been delightful and Miss Moss thought that every single girl became a superstar in their role. Fabulous!

Year 5 created a 'Character from the Bag of Hats' this term. The girls chose from a variety of hats before answering a series of character questions to build their character. After sharing and developing their ideas, they wrote a character monologue or duologue to perform to the class. The creativity in the year group was superb and what was even more impressive was the support and encouragement the girls gave each other in the lead up to the performance. They swapped ideas, helped direct each other, gave positive feedback and helpful tips, and as a result, every girl had a moment to really shine.

Year 6 have been busy creating a Historical Character. Picking a moment in history of their choice, the girls took a visit to the past to explore different time periods, locations and then, as their character developed, movement and physicality. Exciting characters were created from the Victorian era, the Egyptians, the Ice Age, WWI and WWII! Following their ideas, the girls were given the option to write a monologue, duologue or diary entry with the focus on characterisation and physicality. PE and Games

In swimming this term the **Little** Malties have been developing their water confidence while swimming with floats, blowing bubbles underwater and feeling comfortable with their faces being underwater. Nursery girls have also been building on their water confidence and some girls have been learning to swim unaided. Girls in **Reception** have been working on their ability to swim by themselves and also working on swimming longer distances. Similarly, the Year 1 and 2 girls have been developing the stamina to swim longer distances, working towards 25m. Meanwhile, the older girls in the **Prep School** have been working on their endurance swimming this term. Different year groups have been working towards different times counting the number of lengths they can do in the set time. In addition, Year 6 started enjoying synchronised swimming, developing basic skills and routines.

Out of the pool, **Little Malties** have been working really hard to improve their physical development skills through climbing and jumping off blocks and playing with different types of equipment. All of this is in preparation for when they move up to Nursery.

In **Nursery** the girls have been working on improving their agility, balance and co-ordination skills. They have done lots of different types of movements, including running and changing direction, hopping, skipping and jumping. Also the girls have been doing many different co-ordination exercises, which will prepare them for the summer term sports and activities.

In their games lessons, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 have been focusing on their football skills this term - dribbling, passing, control skills and shooting - all leading up to playing a full game.

Reception girls have also been working on their Physical Literacy through ball skills, jumping and skipping. While girls in Years 1 and 2 have been working on their Physical Literacy in their training for their House Games competition, a

fun event which included skipping and hula challenges, ski walks in teams and so much more. The girls had a great time working together to score points for their House. The final scores were as follows:

Huge thanks to **Myla (2K)** for raising £565 for Great Ormond Street Hospital in celebration of her birthday.


